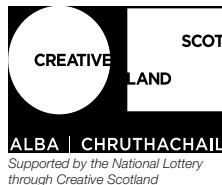

DENISE MINA

Denise Mina is the author of nine crime novels - the *Garnethill Trilogy* which featured Maureen O'Donnell, an ex psychiatric patient; *Sanctum*, which was a stand alone novel. The Paddy Meehan series, the first of which, *The Field of Blood*, has just been produced for BBC Scotland starring Peter Capaldi, David Morrissey and Ford Keirnan and will screen later this year. She has also written two plays, two polybags worth of short stories and a radio play. She wrote the Hellblazer series of comics for a year, bringing Constantine to Glasgow. Last year Vertigo published her graphic novel 'A Sickness in the Family' about the Ussher family who are obsessed with house prices.



AIDAN MOFFAT

Aidan Moffat was born in Falkirk in 1973. He has been writing and recording music since 1996, including ten years in Arab Strap (disbanded in 2006), a few years as L. Pierre (horizontal instrumentals), a spoken word album, a solo album, and lots of obscure ephemera. One of his stories is included in the anthology *The Year of Open Doors* - an exciting assembly of Scotland's most promising new writers.



DON PATERSON

Don Paterson was born in 1963 in Dundee, Scotland. He moved to London in 1984 to work as a jazz musician, and began writing poetry around the same time. His poetry has won a number of awards, including the Forward Prize for Best First Collection, the Whitbread Poetry Prize, the Geoffrey Faber Memorial Award, and the T S Eliot Prize on two occasions. Most recently, *Rain* won the 2009 Forward prize. He is a Fellow of the Royal Society of Literature and a Fellow of the English Association; he received the OBE in 2008 and the Queen's Gold Medal for Poetry in 2010. He teaches poetry at the University of St Andrews, and since 1996 has been poetry editor at Picador.



IAN STEPHEN

Ian Stephen was born in Stornoway, Isle of Lewis and lives there now. For many years he worked for the Coastguard Service. He was the inaugural winner of the Robert Louis Stevenson Award in 1995. From then he has worked full time in the arts and has published many collections of poetry and one of short stories. His work often involves navigation. He won a Creative Scotland Award (2002-3) to sail through the geography of Scottish maritime stories. Ian travels widely to tell stories and perform his poetry, often combined with music or film.



ELEANOR THOM

Eleanor Thom was born in London in 1979 to parents from the North East of Scotland. She studied Creative Writing at Glasgow University, and now lives in Ayr. Eleanor won the New Writing Ventures Award in 2006 with a chapter of her debut novel, *The Tin-Kin*. Based on photos, artifacts and interviews with her mother's Travelling family, some of whom are still 'on the road' today, *The Tin-Kin* was published by Duckworth in Spring 2009. The novel later won The Saltire First Book Award, and was recently chosen by BBC2's *The Culture Show* for a special feature on new British novelists. Eleanor began work on a second novel, set in France, after being awarded a Robert Louis Stevenson Fellowship

STUART KELLY

Stuart Kelly is the Literary Editor of Scotland on Sunday and a regular contributor to BBC Radio Scotland's The Radio Cafe. He is the author of *The Book of Lost Books*, which has been published in 14 countries worldwide, and *Scott-land: The Man Who Invented A Nation*, which was Radio 4's Book of the Week.



CHRISTINE DE LUCA

Christine De Luca (Pearson) was born and brought up in Shetland. She is a prize-winning poet, writing in both English and Shetlandic. She has had five collections of poetry published, most recently *North End of Eden* (Luath Press 2010) and won the poetry Prix du Livre Insulaire 2007 for a bilingual Selected. She has been involved in translation activities and has had poetry published in many languages. She has taken Shetland poetry to Norway, Finland, France, Italy and India as well as all over Scotland. Christine is a founding member of Hansel Cooperative Press which promotes art and literature projects in Orkney and Shetland. She is an active member of Shore Poets which provides a monthly platform for poetry in Edinburgh.



LINDEN MACINTYRE

Linden MacIntyre is a journalist who has worked in print, radio and television during a career dating back to the 1960s. He's the author of four published books - two works of fiction and two non-fiction. He's a native of Cape Breton, from a family with roots in South Uist. His father was a native Gaelic speaker for whom Gaelic was the preferred medium of communication in his dealings with other Gaelic speakers, especially his parents who had difficulty speaking English. MacIntyre works for the Canadian public broadcaster, CBC, where he is a co-host of a popular investigative television program, *the fifth estate*. He has won numerous awards for work on the CBC and the U.S. public broadcasting program, *Frontline*, and for his books. His most recent novel, *The Bishop's Man*, was winner of the 2009 Scotiabank Giller prize for fiction.



PETER MACKAY

Peter Mackay is a writer and broadcast journalist. He has lectured in 20th century literature at Trinity College Dublin and Queen's University Belfast, and has written widely on contemporary Scottish, Irish and Scottish Gaelic literature. A pamphlet of poems, *From another island* was published by Clutag Press in 2010, and the critical study *Sorley MacLean* was also published in 2010 by the Research Institute for Irish and Scottish Studies. He currently works for BBC Alba on radio and television news, and is also working on a collection of transgressive Scottish Gaelic poetry.



BERNARD MACLAVERY

Bernard MacLavery was born in Belfast but now lives in Glasgow. He has published five collections of short stories, (the latest is '*Matters of Life & Death*') and four novels - *Lamb*, *Cal*, *Grace Notes* and *The Anatomy School*. He has written versions of his fiction for other media - radio plays, television plays, screenplays and libretti. He wrote and directed a short film 'Bye-Child' which won a BAFTA Scotland Award for Best First Director and a BAFTA nomination for Best Short Film. He is a member of Aosdana in Ireland

NIALL MACLEOD, THE POLBAIN BARD (1855-1922) by RODDIE MACLEOD

In the early 1950s Roddie Macleod of Polbain began a small archiving project to attempt to preserve the last vestiges of the known Gaelic verse composed by Neil Macleod, the Polbain Bard. Echoes and memories of the oral compositions were then only just in the memories of Roddie's elders and family, in the twilight years of the Gaelic speaking community in Coigach. In 2005 a definitive account of all the known poetry was published - *An Trubhal na mo Dhorn (The Trowel in my Hand)*. Roddie's talk will be accompanied by music from Kevin Macleod (his son) and Ali 'Beag' Macleod of Achnahaird.

NIALL MACLEOD "THE POLBAIN BARD" 1855-1922

In 2010 following **RODDIE MACLEOD's** 2005 publication of *An Trubhal na mo Dhorn (The Trowel in my Hand)* Roddie's son, musician **KEVIN MACLEOD** introduced three of the best poems, spoken by Roddie, with accompanying music, on a locally produced CD *Braes of Badentarbat*, featuring the accordion and verse of **ALI 'BEAG' MACLEOD** of Achnahaird. The talk will present a glimpse back into the long vanished world of the Polbain Bard, where images of boats, lobster fishing, hardships, enforced clearance, lost loves and poverty are made so vibrant through his words. Music from the CD by Ali 'Beag' and Kevin will also be performed live.

JOHN BURNSIDE

John Burnside has published a dozen collections of poetry, the most recent of which is *The Hunt in the Forest*, (Jonathan Cape 2009). His prose works include seven novels, a collection of short stories and two volumes of memoir, *A Lie About My Father* and *Waking Up In Toytown*. Forthcoming work includes a new novel, *A Summer of Drowning*, and a collection of poems entitled *Black Cat Bone* (August 2011).

MAOILIOS CAIMBEUL

Gaelic poet Maoilios Caimbeul / Myles Campbell comes from Staffin, Isle of Skye, where he now lives. He has published 6 verse collections, plus a co-authored collection with Mark Goodwin, and *Breac-a'-Mhuiltein*, selected poems 1974-2006. He is the author of 6 children's and teenage novels in Gaelic, one adult novel *Teas* (Ùrsgeul, 2010) and a Gaelic grammar workbook for schools.

NORA CHASSLER

Nora Chassler grew up in NYC. She has worked as a waitress, a model, a social worker, a full time mother, a teacher and a writer. She now lives in Dundee. Her first novel, *Miss Thing*, was published by Two Ravens Press in 2010. She is currently finishing her second novel *Grandmother Divided by Monkey Equals Outer Space*, about a very stoned family on the Upper West Side of Manhattan in the early 1980s and their dealings with a dying palmist. She is also busy with an early draft of her third novel which appears to be about whales, whaling, Dundee, mental illness and maternal love.

ROBERT ALAN JAMIESON

Robert Alan Jamieson was born in Shetland in 1958, and grew up there in the crofting community of Saanis (Sandness). After publishing three books while in his twenties, he attended the University of Edinburgh as a mature student and, since 1993, has pioneered the tuition of creative writing there. He has also been Writer-in-Residence at the Universities of Glasgow and Strathclyde, William Soutar Fellow in Perth, and a co-editor of Edinburgh Review from 1993-98. His most recent books are a bi-lingual collection of poetry in Shetlandic and English with photographs, *Nort Atlantik Drift* (2007), and the novel *Da Happie Laand*, described by the Scottish Review as 'an epic and poetic fable', which was shortlisted for the Saltire Society's Scottish Book of the Year Award in 2010.

DOUG JOHNSTONE

Doug Johnstone is a writer, musician and journalist based in Edinburgh. His new novel, *Smokeheads*, was published by Faber and Faber in March 2011. He has previously published two novels with Penguin, *Tombstoning* (2006) and *The Ossians* (2008), which received praise from the likes of Irvine Welsh, Ian Rankin and Christopher Brookmyre. Doug is currently writer in residence at the University of Strathclyde. He has recently had several short stories appear in various publications, and since 1999 he has worked as a freelance arts journalist. He is a singer, musician and songwriter in several bands, including Northern Alliance, part of the Fence Collective. Northern Alliance have released four albums to critical acclaim, as well as recording an album as a fictional band called The Ossians.
