Things were going well for Meher and her family until the Indian government announced the world's largest coronavirus lockdown. As Covid-19 cases in their Mumbai slum soar, Meher and her family realize that they have no choice but to leave for their village in Rajasthan. With the ban on public movement, it becomes clear that they would have to walk the 900 kms, facing barbaric police officers, searing heat, wild beasts and indifferent deities. A deeply moving story about family, survival and relentless hope, *Homebound* brings to the page the stark realities of those who have remained too long without a voice.

Hamish Napier is a Scottish folk multi-instrumentalist and composer inspired by the heritage and nature of his native landscape of Strathspey. Hamish's music is innovative, incorporating sounds from jazz, electronica and classical music, while also celebrating and respecting Scotland's rich musical heritage. Humorous, engaging and heart-warming, Hamish's performances are often interdisciplinary, incorporating poems and stories about nature and folklore.

Kirstin Innes is the author of the novels Fishnet, which won the Guardian's Not The Booker Prize in 2015, and Scabby Queen (nominated for the 2020 Scottish Novel of the Year) and she has written both fiction and documentaries for Radio 4. Kirstin is currently working on the script for a large-scale musical and her third novel, Semiprecious, which tells the story of a village over a thousand years.

Several of his books have been bestsellers and three, **A Dark Matter** (2020), **Breakers** (2019) and **The Jump** (2015), were shortlisted for the McIlvanney Prize for Scottish Crime Novel of the Year. His latest novel The Space Between Us is due out in mid-March. It is a first-contact thriller set in the Scottish Highlands, a book about connection and our place in the universe.



LINDA BAULD, GAVIN FRANCIS AND JEANE FREEMAN

Professor Linda Bauld OBE is the Bruce and John Usher Chair in Public Health in the Usher Institute, College of Medicine, University of Edinburgh and Chief Social Policy Adviser to the Scottish Government. For the past 25 years she has led studies to prevent or treat the main modifiable risk factors for Non-Communicable Diseases. She has also been involved in research on Covid-19 and



worked extensively with the media during the pandemic. **Gavin Francis** is a GP between Edinburgh, Orkney and Sutherland, and the author of eight prize-winning books of non-fiction. His account of the first 18 months of the Covid pandemic *Intensive Care: a GP, a Community, & a Pandemic* was a notable book of the year in The Herald, Scotsman, Financial Times, Observer, Irish Times, and New Statesman. **Jeane Freema**n was an SNP MSP and Government minister for 5 years until 2021. She was Health Secretary during the Covid pandemic and played a key role in leading the Scottish Government's response and actions to this major public health threat. Since retiring from elected politics, she has worked with both the University of Glasgow and Queen Margaret University.

MÀRTAINN MAC A' BHÀILLIDH

Martin Baillie is an architect and has extensive experience of major public projects in Glasgow; he also has first-hand experience of residential development in the Highlands through his time working in Skye. However, he now works as Adult Learning Manager at Sabhal Mòr Ostaig and lives on a croft in the north of Skye. Martin was one of the course developers who created the Scottish Gaelic course on Duolingo and in his role at SMO is responsible for the ongoing development of both the Duolingo and SpeakGaelic courses. Martin is also a volunteer organiser with the Scotland-wide, independent grassroots advocacy group Misneachd which he helped establish in 2016. Martin leads Misneachd's campaigns highlighting the impact that the rural housing crisis has on Gaelic speaking communities, work which recently led him to contribute to Breanndán Ó Beaglaoich's RTÉ programme on housing, 'The Man with the Moving House'.

Don Paterson is the author of numerous works of poetry and non-fiction; his writing has won many awards, including the Whitbread Poetry Prize, the Geoffrey Faber Memorial Prize, the Costa Poetry Award, all three Forward Prizes, and the T. Stephen's peerless improvisational skills and talent for composition makes him one of Scotland's most exciting and prodigious musical talents.
